From the Director:

Once again the Baldwinsville Public Library was a busy place in 2012, with attendance up almost 6%, to 318,061 visits. Usage increased in many other areas as well, including items checked out, program attendance, number of active patrons, and reference questions answered. The total number of items provided to our patrons from other libraries totaled 64,844, almost 21,000 people used the public Internet computers, and more than 11,000 individuals used our meeting rooms. Collection size increased, with the total number of electronic books available for downloading more than doubling to 7.552 available for downloading more than doubling, to 7,552.

Although our federal stimulus grant concluded in September, we were very fortunate to retain two of our grant employees. This allows us to continue our successful and popular programs such as computer training, employment and resume guidance, technical assistance with various electronic devices, and community outreach to the business community. The grant also made it possible for us to purchase equipment for use in our newly-configured training lab and videoconferencing equipment for use by community members and in cooperative library programs with other locations.

During 2012 the library installed cameras and a new video surveillance system, as well as a new internal telephone system, offsite computer back-up, and expanded shelving for music CDs. Program registration and the events calendar are now available online. Repairs included new railings for the outside handicapped ramp, sealing the elevator pit, reupholstering the easy chairs, and stabilizing the fiction shelving. Policies and by-laws are being revised and updated.

The Library Board works hard to balance community needs with fiscal responsibility. The proposed budget for 2013-2014 is anticipated to result in a **total** tax bill of \$61.67 for homes in the Baldwinsville School District with a \$100,000 assessment. This is a **total** increase of \$1.88 per year over the current tax rate of \$59.79 per \$100,000 assessment. To reduce costs, the Board has also recently signed a new contract with BOCES for greatly reduced electric rates and secured a Library Construction Grant providing for insulation of the wall-ceiling interface throughout the building. They also hold fundraising events during the year.

This year marks my 30th year as Director, and I am planning to retire this summer. I have been very fortunate to serve the Baldwinsville community, which has always been so supportive of the library, from the approval of the current building to providing the funds to operate it successfully. I am thrilled to have overseen the growth of the library and its services, and so lucky to have had the cooperation of the wonderful and dedicated people on the Board and staff.



The library fiscal year runs fror	n July 1 to June 3	30 each year.

The proposed library budget for 2013-2014 is \$1,533,410. It is anticipated that the **total library tax bill** for 2013-2014 for homes with \$100,000 assessments in Lysander, Van Buren and Clay will be **\$61.67**. This is an anticipated increase of \$1.88 per year.

Taxpayers within the Baldwinsville School District are eligible to vote on the library budget April 25, 2013 if they are at least 18 years of age and have lived in the school district for at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Our Broadbandexpress@yourlibrary (BTOP) Grant Continues

- The library has two well-established one-on-one help services, one for digital literacy (basic and more advanced) and one for the jobseeker. Each session is tailor-made to meet the needs of the individual.
- Tech Help Drop-In on Friday mornings is another service begun during the grant period. Every Friday morning from 10 am to 12 pm patrons can bring in a device or ask a question of the two librarians available.
- In 2012, the smaller public access computer room was converted to a training lab. The SMART Board and a digital projector were mounted to the wall, an additional projector was purchased and the laptops which were bought with BTOP funds in 2010 are used as permanent training stations.
- As a result of partnerships with both PEACE Inc. and the Greater Baldwinsville Chamber of Commerce (GBCC) the library continues to be a vital part of the community. Several people have come to the library for assistance in finding work through referrals from PEACE Inc, which has discontinued its own resume/cover letter assistance program. Nancy Howe is now serving on the Chamber's Board of Directors as Secretary.
- Two librarians, Nancy Howe (PCC Project Librarian) and Robert Loftus (PCC System Training Assistant)
 are now permanently on the staff. Nancy is working full time as the Public Relations/Outreach Librarian
 and Robert is the half-time Information Technology Librarian.
- Retaining these positions has allowed the library to continue and enhance the work that was begun by the BTOP grant.
